Halim and Mina, are a loving married couple who run a traditional caftan store in one of Morocco's oldest medinas but between them they harbour the secret, that Halim is a closeted gay man. To keep up with the demands of their customers, they hire a talented young man as an apprentice but as a result their lives become more complicated when Mina realises how much her husband is moved by the young man's presence. A tender and moving story sensitively played out.

Waithira explores a woman's intimate background and its intersections with forgotten Kenyan history, pop culture and the diaspora. Her path of discovery takes her to Germany, Wales and Kenya, picking up the threads of family ties and exploring the concept of identity as she uncovers fragmented histories.

This remarkable film set in 1961 at the onset of the Angolan War of Independence, follows the struggles of Angolan militants involved with the MPLA, an anti-colonial political movement of which director Maldoror's husband was a leader. It is a landmark testimony to the determination and commitment of the colonial resistance movement in Angola. Maldoror was the first African woman to direct a feature film and she sensitively shows the ways in which motherhood and family are part and parcel of a revolution – superb political storytelling.

Based on the novel by Adam Shafi we glimpse a slice of social history and the struggle for Zanzibar's independence.

This compassionate film is shockingly relevant and heartbreakingly sad – a sombre reminder of what thousands of young people today are facing across Europe.



Post performance in conversation with the actors

Tonderai Munyevu brings an adaption of his critically acclaimed play Mugabe, My Dad & Me to Bristol as part of Afrika Eye 2022. Performing as himself Tonderai delves deep into his personal history and that of his country to tell his story. Born in Zimbabwe in 1982, he was one of the so-called "born frees" – part of the generation born after Independence, he has experienced major personal and political change.

He describes how the first cracks of prosperous Zimbabwe's decline started to appear in the 1990s, and his mother felt compelled to emigrate with him to England in search of stability, a difficult and emotional transition, but where he has continued to live. Tonderai's story is interwoven with the compelling and spiritual sounds of the traditional 'mbira' played by Shona cultural artist Millicent Chapanda. Music which has been at the heart of cultural ceremonies and celebrations of Zimbabwean life for centuries.

Bawren Tavaziva brings the film of his latest work, 'Boys Khaya' to Arnolfini. His aim is to inspire and ignite interest in contemporary African dance. His innovative approach to contemporary practice counters many of the generic African dance styles.

His connection to Afrika Eye reaches back to when Ingrid Sinclair (founder of Afrika Eye) made 'Dance Got Me' in 2006, exploring his early career in Zimbabwe.

"This work focuses on my childhood experiences. The little houses behind White family mansions are called a BOY'S KHAYA. My mother and my father used to work for a rich White family and my parents lived in the BOY'S KHAYA"
